
Changes to Ofsted inspections

Ofsted inspections offer an independent evaluation of education providers and identifying areas of strength and areas for improvement. During an Ofsted inspection, Inspectors collect evidence in various ways and assess them using an inspection framework. Inspections ensuring compliance with policies and legislation related to safeguarding, equality, and diversity, ensure expected standards of care and education. As an apprentice working in Early Years, it's important to understand how inspections are changing so you can be prepared and engage positively with the process.

Key Changes

From 10 November 2025 the updated framework and inspection toolkits will begin to apply to early years, schools and further education providers.

- The frequency of routine inspections for is being reduced from every 6 years to every 4 years.
- A new 5-point grading scale will replace the previous judgement labels.
- The introduction of a new report card style of publishing inspection findings.
- A stronger emphasis on how settings promote inclusion, support children with SEND, and disadvantage children.
- Safeguarding will feature as a separate category on report cards with the grading "met" or "not met".

What this means for you as an apprentice

Inspectors will place emphasis on what the setting provides and how it supports all children, your contributions through observations, planning and interactions matter.

Training & development opportunities. If the setting is preparing for an inspection under the new framework, you may be involved in meetings about your curriculum, inclusion and development of children's progress.

Importance of being aware of how the setting meets the needs of children with additional needs and being able to talk about how you support this.

Be prepared. Keeping your professional demeanour, records (learning journals, planning, observations) and awareness of safeguarding will stand you in good stead.

Use the changes in your apprenticeship evidence you're required to reflect on how the setting promotes quality, inclusion or how your role supports children's outcomes, you can reference the new inspection focus to show your awareness of the sector's evolving expectations.



Top Tips to be inspector ready...

- Know the setting's curriculum and your role in it how you contribute to children's learning and development.
- Be able to explain how you support inclusion, special educational needs and disadvantaged children.
- Understand safeguarding in your setting: you should know the policy; know how to record/report concerns relating to safeguarding and welfare.
- Ask questions if you're unsure about how inspection changes affect your role, talk to your mentor/supervisor.

Do you know the statutory requirements?

The Early Years Foundation Stage Statutory Framework sets the standards that all providers must meet and is mandatory for all providers. There are two separate documents, one for group and school-based providers and one for childminders. You must ensure that you are following the correct version for your setting.

- The Statutory Framework is split in three sections
- Learning and Development These shape what children and taught, through the 7 areas of learning development and how their development is monitored and progresses.
- Assessment This section sets out what providers must meet and guidance on formative and summative assessments
- Safeguarding and welfare requirements Set out what providers must do to safeguard children, ensure safety and suitability of staff, promote, support and understand.


Continued Professional Development (CPD)

Focus on Theory: Friedrich Froebel (1782 - 1852)

Friedrich Froebel was a German educator and opened the first Kindergarten. He believed that children learn best through play and exploration, with educators supporting their natural curiosity and following their interests.

Key Principles of the theory

- Unity and Connection: All aspects of life are interconnected.
- Education should reflect the child's whole world family, culture and emotions.
- Self-Led, Reflective Learning: Children learn best through curiosity, exploration and reflection.
- Enabling Environment: Settings should provide open-ended, real-life experiences and materials.
- Value of Family: Strong partnerships between families and educators help children thrive.
- Nature: Outdoor experiences are vital for learning, physical well-being, creativity, and a spiritual growth. This principle encourages children to explore the natural world.
- Importance of Play: Play builds perseverance, problemsolving, communication and relationships and is an important tool for cognitive, emotional, and social development.
- Creativity: Singing, dancing and rhymes are essential for expression and joy.
- Gifts and Occupations: Froebel's "gifts" encouraged openended play, while "occupations" supported creativity and problem-solving.



Artificial Intelligence



Al is becoming increasingly part of our everyday lives, this could be as part of social media feeds, chatbots, virtual assistants, voice assistant and search engines. Al can bring efficiency and productivity to our lives, such as automating schedules, generating reports, and greater access to information. As with all technology, Al poses risks which we should be mindful of when using this technology.

Benefits of Al

- Study Support
- Can help break down topics into manageable and understandable information and can help with correcting spelling, grammar and punctuation.
- Creating timetables, schedules and reminders
- Can help with problem solving and creating new ideas

The risks you need to know

- Privacy and Data Protection -Never share personal or company details with AI tools. Make sure to check your workplace policies and procedures before using AI at work.
- Accuracy Al may not produce accurate results. Make sure to check the information.
- Reliance on AI AI can be used to support you in studies, but it is important to ensure that this is used as a support tool, not as a quick way of producing that last minute assignment.

The Rise of AI Companions

Al companions or virtual friends are becoming more common, especially on social media and chat apps. They can hold realistic conversations, remember personal details, and respond with empathy-like messages. But they come with serious risks:

- False sense of connection
- Impact on Mental Health
- Data and privacy dangers

The importance of mathematical skills in Early Years

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Maths plays a crucial role in the effective running of an early years setting and in supporting children's holistic development. For childcare practitioners and apprentices, a strong understanding of mathematical concepts is essential — not only for everyday practical tasks but also for promoting children's cognitive growth and problem-solving abilities.



Supporting children's mathematical development

Early years practitioners play a vital role in introducing mathematical ideas through playbased learning. According to the EYFS (DfE, 2021), maths is one of the prime areas of learning, focusing on number and numerical patterns. Practitioners can encourage this by:

- Providing opportunities for counting and one-to-one correspondence, for example, counting how many children are present or how many cups are needed at snack time.
- Encouraging spatial awareness and shape recognition through construction play or shape-sorting games.
- · Supporting early measurement skills, such as comparing the heights of towers, the lengths of ribbons, or the capacities of containers in water plau.

Through these experiences, children develop confidence in mathematical language, reasoning, and problemsolving — all of which lay the foundations for future learning.

The professional importance of numeracy

A confident approach to maths enhances a practitioner's professional competence and the quality of care provided. It ensures accuracy in record-keeping, health and safety compliance, and supports reflective practice. Moreover, demonstrating enthusiasm and

confidence in maths helps foster a positive attitude toward learning in children, showing them that maths is relevant, engaging, and part of everyday life.



Maths in professional practice

- · Calculating ratios of staff to children to ensure compliance with the Statutory Framework for the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS).
- Measuring and weighing ingredients during cooking or craft activities, modelling accurate use of units and quantities for children.
- Managing time effectively to plan structured routines such as knowing how long to allow for group activities, rest, or transitions.
- · Recording observations and data, such as tracking a child's progress, monitoring attendance, or maintaining accident logs.
- · Handling money when planning fundraising events, ordering resources, or supporting role-play activities related to shopping and budgeting.

These tasks require accuracy, problem-solving, and reasoning — all key mathematical competencies.

In summary, maths is not just a subject — it is a vital professional skill and a cornerstone of early education. By applying mathematical understanding in daily practice, childcare apprentices contribute to both the smooth operation of the setting and the developmental progress of the children in their care.



THE ROLE OF AN EARLY YEARS TEACHER

Thinking about your next steps in your career? Want to go further in Early Years Education?

If you're passionate about working with children and making a real difference in their early development, becoming an Early Years Teacher could be the perfect next step for you.

Early Years Teacher (with Qualified Teacher Status, QTS

Early Years Teachers are specialists in working in with children aged 0 - 5 years. Their role is about leading learning and ensuring high-quality teaching and care that meets every child's needs.

They:

- Plan and deliver engaging, play-based learning experiences.
- Observe, assess, and track children's progress using the EYFS framework.
- Work closely with families to support each child's development.
- Lead teams of practitioners, modelling best practice and mentoring others.
- Ensure environments are inclusive, stimulating, and safe.
- Have comprehensive knowledge of teaching and course planning

How can I get there?

This could include:

- Undergraduate routes studying full-time at university.
- Postgraduate routes (PGCE) for those with a degree, combining study with practical teaching placements.
- Employment-based routes earning while you train.
